HOTEL

Prairie Meadows features a beautiful hotel with contemporary rooms, impeccable service, and generous hotel amenities that include a saltwater pool, business center, fitness center, and airport shuttle. The award-winning hotel offers double, queen, and king rooms as well as a variety of luxury suites. Conveniently connected to the casino, the hotel allows guests to stay and play.

DINING

OURHISTORY

As we enter our 30th year, we look back on decades of achievements – from finding a location in a vacant pasture to transforming it into a beautiful racetrack, luxury hotel, award-winning restaurants, and a casino with every game this side of Vegas.

1980s

In the early 1980s, several local businessmen had a vision that would help lowa's agricultural community, spur economic development and job growth in central lowa, and create a dynamic entertainment venue that would attract visitors from all over the Midwest. That vision was Prairie Meadows Racetrack.

Ken Grandquist, Jack Bishop, Ed Skinner, Jim Rasmussen, and Gary Palmer were local leaders and entrepreneurs who had spent their lives in central lowa. Over the course of several years, these five men – with the help of hundreds of local supporters, volunteers, and civic leaders – promoted the business concept of Prairie Meadows Racetrack.

In July 1984 the Iowa Racing Commission issued the state's first pari-mutuel license that would allow for the construction of a horse track. A 240-acre site of pastureland, just east of Adventureland Park, was selected as the location for this new venture.

The Polk County Board of Supervisors voted to back the \$40 million in bonds necessary to build the track. The racehorses burst out of Prairie Meadows' starting gate for the very first time on March 1, 1989. Despite cold temps, a sellout crowd of more than 7,100 were there, eager to wager on lowa's first horse races.

1990s

The early 1990s brought new economic challenges to the state of lowa. These challenges weighed heavily on Prairie Meadows' bottom line. The revenue from horse racing and dining at Prairie Meadows was not meeting expectations, and the property was forced to file for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection in November of 1991.

The team of Bishop, Palmer, Rasmussen, and Skinner collaborated with Polk County leaders and worked to get a bill passed in the Iowa legislature that would allow Prairie Meadows to incorporate slot machine gaming. After much hard work, the bill was approved by a single vote. It was signed into law by Governor Terry Branstad in 1994. In May of that same year, Polk County voters also approved the referendum of adding slot machines by a 62 to 38 percent margin.

With approval from the state and county, it was now time to decide how to manage Prairie Meadows. President of the Racing Association of central lowa, Jim Rasmussen, had an idea that





would greatly benefit Polk County. He envisioned Prairie Meadows running as a public nonprofit, dedicated to lessening the burden of government by raising funds for charitable organizations and community improvement projects. It was quickly decided that Prairie Meadows would be managed locally and overseen by a board of directors. That decision in 1994 has resulted in hundreds of millions of dollars in profits remaining in Iowa and Polk County – profits that would have left the state if an outside management firm had taken over day-to-day operations of Prairie Meadows. Prairie Meadows is currently one of only two casinos in the U.S. that functions as a nonprofit.

On April 1, 1995, a capacity crowd of 15,000 poured through the doors of the nation's first racino – a horse track and slot machine casino combination. The addition of slots was met with unprecedented success.

This private-public partnership allowed Prairie Meadows to repay nearly \$90 million of debt to Polk County in just 20 short months. The success continued, and over the years, Prairie Meadows has grown into the No. 1 entertainment destination in Iowa.


2000s – TODAY

In 2004, Prairie Meadows added table games to the mix. The property expanded its entertainment offerings by adding the The Meadows Events Center in 2007. Soon after, Prairie Meadows opened restaurants Triple Crown Buffet and AJ's Steakhouse. With the completion of Prairie Meadows Hotel in 2012, quests were able to stay and play – making Prairie Meadows a major tourist destination. Another restaurant, Café at the Meadows debuted shortly after. And in 2016, a new loyalty program titled Prairie Gold Rewards launched. This robust program rewards gaming and non-gaming guests and offers some of the best casino benefits in the Midwest.

Prairie Meadows is the result of a complete community effort, thanks to the commitment of volunteers, business leaders, elected officials, and hundreds of others who have been instrumental in the development and continued success of one of the great private-public business experiments in the entertainment industry.

Prairie Meadows had a record-breaking year of giving in 2018. Through our Legacy Grant program, we awarded more than \$3.5 million to organizations and communities in Iowa.

Our Legacy Grant Program provides funding in the range of \$100,000 to \$1 million for large-scale, signature projects in central lowa.

Ames Foundation

Ames Miracle Playground and Field Grant Amount: \$100,000

More than 3,500 children with special needs between the ages of five and 15 reside in Polk, Boone, Dallas, and Story counties. The Ames Foundation recognized a lack of recreational facilities and opportunities for these individuals to participate in sports leagues. To better serve these community members, the Ames Foundation decided to build an all-inclusive playground and Miracle League Field in Inis Grove Park. Miracle League serves children and adults who suffer from physical or mental disabilities that may be excluded, whether intentionally or not, from conventional baseball leagues.

The Ames Miracle Playground and Field is a two-part project. Part one is an all-inclusive playground. The fully accessible structure, built on a rubberized surface will provide a sensory-rich experience for children of all ages and abilities. The playground is designed as five components, working together as one, to offer socialization, education, and fun to children with physical, cognitive, and sensory disabilities. The playground focuses on maximum play for all children, but also allows parents, guardians, and grandparents with physical disabilities to experience a playground with their loved ones – likely for the first time.

The second part of the project is a custom field made of cushioned, rubberized turf, accessible by wheelchair and other assistive devices. The field provides a barrier-free sports facility that can host competitive and

noncompetitive athletic events, targeted specifically toward those with disabilities. The Ames Foundation plans to open the park in 2019.

Boys & Girls Clubs of Central Iowa Club Pathways

Grant Amount: \$400,000

Boys & Girls Clubs of Central Iowa's (BGCCI) mission is "To inspire and enable all young people, especially those who need us most, to reach their full potential as productive, caring, responsible citizens." In an effort to fulfill this mission, BGCCI developed Club Pathways. This project will double the number of youth BGCCI

serves, from 1,700 to 3,300. It will also add three new

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Club sites and significantly expand two current Club sites. Ultimately, this project will create four paths in Des Moines that allow kids and teens to progress from elementary through high school with BGCCI by their side.

The new Gregory & Suzie Glazer Burt Club on Drake University's campus will complete an entirely new Central Path. This will be BGCCI's first family Club, welcoming all students K-12. This innovative model of a Club on a private university campus is only one of three that exists in the nation. The new Club at East High School will complete the East Path for members who previously attended the Levitt and Baker Clubs. Programs will focus on workforce development, technology, and financial literacy to ensure members are on track to graduate and have a plan for the future. The new Studebaker Club will serve elementary school children of the South Path. The existing McCombs Middle School Club will receive an expansion to serve Lincoln High School students to complete the South Path. Finally, the existing Frank J. Ross Club of the West Path will expand to serve a growing population of students. The entire Club Pathways project is expected to be completed by 2022.

Community Foundation of Greater Des Moines

Project: Des Moines Regional Skatepark

Grant Amount: \$400,000

Skateboarding is one of the fastest growing sports in America, and Des Moines' skateboarding community is booming. Yet, there is no centrally located facility that accommodates this sport. Consequently, skaters are forced to look to parking lots, sidewalks, streets, and other public property for this activity. Community visionaries wanted to give skateboarders a safe place to pursue their passion while also reducing the time and energy spent deterring skating on private property by law enforcement, business owners, and community members. Volunteers with the Des Moines Regional Skatepark joined with the Community Foundation of Greater Des Moines and the plan was born.

The park, named Lauridsen Skatepark, will sit alongside Des Moines' Principal Riverwalk. Lauridsen Skatepark was designed by California Skateparks, with great care taken to ensure the park will be an attractive extension of the Principal Riverwalk.

At 65,000 square feet, it will be one of the largest open skateparks in the nation. The park will be built to Olympic standard, allowing Des Moines to host regional and possibly national competitions.

A world-class skatepark in Des Moines is an investment in youth and will also increase tourism and promote economic development in central Iowa. The park will provide a safe, fun, and challenging environment for people of all ages to exercise and socialize. It is estimated that the park will bring in 40,000 visits from skaters each year.

A groundbreaking ceremony for the Lauridsen Skatepark was held on October 15, 2018. The \$3.5 million skatepark is expected to be completed in 2019.

Dallas County

Raccoon River Valley Trail to High Trestle Trail Connector Project Grant Amount: \$100,000

The Des Moines area contains many trails that provide residents and visitors a safe and scenic place to exercise. But there are still some trail gaps throughout the area. In an effort to close some of these gaps, Dallas County decided to connect two of the premier trail systems in the state of Iowa – the Raccoon River Valley Trail (RRVT) and the High Trestle Trail (HTT). These two trails bolster Iowa's bicycle tourism. They directly feed into the Des Moines metro trail system and are utilized by hundreds of thousands of people annually.

In addition to closing trail gaps, this project will provide additional trail loops, increase trail networking, and connect 20 communities in six counties. This connector trail will run from the city of Perry through the town of Bouton and continue to the town of Woodward. The connector trail will be 9 miles long, making the RRVT a total of 89 miles of completed trail while the HTT will total 25 miles of completed trail.

The first 1.5-mile segment of the trail that begins in Perry officially opened in October 2018. Phase 2 of the project, slated to begin in 2019, will start in Woodward and work west. The \$5 million project will continue moving forward as funding comes in.



Des Moines Heritage Trust

Project: Des Moines Heritage Center

Grant Amount: \$100,000

Heritage organizations in central lowa are facing many challenges. The Des Moines Historical Society is forced to meet in member's homes or offices as they have no brick-and-mortar home. This organization has historical artifacts of Des Moines to exhibit, but nowhere to display them. Sadly, this is also true of other local heritage organizations. To help fix this issue, the Des Moines Heritage Trust developed the Des Moines Heritage Center project.

This project aims to provide a home for local heritage organizations, as well as empower these organizations to grow and prosper with the community. The Des Moines Heritage Center will be comprised of the historic 1909 East Des Moines Union Depot and an event center adjacent to the depot building. The Des Moines Heritage Center is more than a capital campaign to rehab a Des Moines landmark. Together, these two buildings will provide home and economic security for various local heritage organizations – Des Moines Heritage Trust, Des Moines Historical Society, Des Moines Rehabbers Club, and Friends of Des Moines Street Cars. Des Moines Heritage Trust anticipates additional organizations will join as the project proceeds.

The depot building will provide a shared office space, board room, and gallery space for organizations to display historical artifacts and information. The event center will provide educational, cultural, and

fundraising opportunities to each of the heritage organizations. The event center will also provide an income to the Des Moines Heritage Center through venue rentals for events like weddings, receptions, and dinners.

The restoration of the depot and construction of the event center is planned to be completed by late 2019.

Des Moines University

Project: Des Moines University Behavioral Health Clinic Grant Amount: \$475.000

One in five adults experience some form of mental illness in a given year, and it is estimated nearly one in 25 adults grapple with serious mental illness daily. Des Moines University (DMU) – a leader in innovative health and science education – recognized a lack of access to mental health services in Iowa. To fight this critical shortfall, DMU came up with a plan to expand its education and clinical services through a Behavioral Health Clinic. The clinic will provide a clinical and social support network for individuals with mental illness.

To make the clinic a reality, DMU is tackling the project in three phases. Phase 1: Education, Phase 2: Mental Health Services, and Phase 3: Workforce to address the shortage of providers.

As the medical school responsible for graduating more family medicine physicians than any medical school (MD or DO) in the United States, DMU has a unique ability to impact future health care providers.

"DMU is exceptionally proud and privileged to have been recognized for our work to expand the University's medical curriculum and clinical services in behavioral health. We consider Prairie Meadows to be an essential partner with us to meet a critical public health need, which has become an urgent priority nationwide."

Through the Phase 1
educational mission, DMU
will be able to frame students'
understanding of what behavioral
health treatment should include. DMU
plans to implement a new model that
embeds behavioral health into primary care
education, along with offering traditional outpatient
specialty mental health care.

Phase 2 includes the construction of the Behavioral Health Clinic. It will be a dedicated floor of the DMU Clinic with 10,000 square feet of space available for offices, patient meeting areas, and conference areas for support group work. The clinic will give community members access to a full spectrum of trained mental health providers.





Iowa High School Athletic Association – Iowa Hall of Pride

Project: Iowa Hall of Pride Technology Overhaul Grant Amount: \$100,000

The lowa Hall of Pride, located in downtown Des Moines, is an interactive museum highlighting facts about lowa and its prominent residents. The lowa Hall of Pride also serves as an event venue. Unfortunately, the lowa Hall of Pride has been operating with outdated technology for several years. To better serve the students, business professionals, and other community members that visit and utilize the museum and its event spaces, a complete technology overhaul was needed.

This multi-phase project included a new cloud-based system for media storage, touchscreen technology for exhibits, and a 360-degree video camera display in the Spirit of Competition room. These updates will allow the museum to continue to bring a one-of-a-kind lowa educational experience to the children and adults of our great state.

Iowa Homeless Youth Centers

Project: IHYC Rooftop Gardens Grant Amount: \$100,000

Iowa Homeless Youth Center (IHYC) is creating an innovative Rooftop Gardens program that serves transition-age youth (aged 18-24) who are currently experiencing homelessness or are at risk of homelessness in central Iowa. Placed on the roof of the Youth Opportunity Center, the gardens include hydroponic farms inside refurbished shipping containers, raised garden beds, an event space, and a produce workshop.

IHYC will hire youth utilizing their programs to maintain and harvest produce year-round. Produce such as herbs and leafy greens grown in the hydroponic farms will be sold to local retailers. Fruits and vegetables grown in the raised beds will be used in the on-site kitchen and will serve more than 600 young adults at IHYC.

An apprentice program for homeless youth will accompany the infrastructure of Rooftop Gardens. The main goal of the Rooftop Gardens program is to break the cycle of poverty for low-income and at-risk youth by providing guided work experience and a livable wage.


Iowa State Fair Blue Ribbon Foundation Project: Iowa State Fair Grandstand Stage and Seating Grant Amount: \$600,000

The lowa State Fair Grandstand's stage, built in the 1980s, was not meeting the current needs of the entertainment industry. To significantly improve the concert experience for all involved – audiences, artists, and staff – the lowa State Fair and Blue Ribbon Foundation planned a major renovation.

The renovations debuted at the 2018 lowa State Fair. The Grandstand updates include added seats, concessions, restrooms, new screens, and a larger stage. The Grandstand venue now seats 14,500 people compared to the original 10,500. The stage expanded by 20 feet and now measures 80' wide by 60' deep. Audiences also enjoy four new 16' x 9' video screens (two on each side of the stage), bringing the action on the stage closer to everyone.

The expanded seating area, named "Prairie Meadows Plaza" in recognition of the \$600,000 Legacy Grant, creates a better experience for attendees. With a new restroom and open space for concessions and merchandise stands, the new layout alleviates congestion by widening aisles and creating areas for people to enjoy the concerts while standing or sitting. The new plaza grows the ground level seating capacity from 900 to 4,000 seats.

The venue underwent many upgrades, but the historic Grandstand structure remains intact. The larger stage and additional seats allow the fair to attract shows with bigger productions.





Justice League of Food

Project: The Kitchen DSM Grant Amount: \$100,000

The Justice League of Food (JLF) developed a commissary kitchen that provides skills, training, and job placement services to homeless and at-risk young adults in central lowa.

The JLF offers eight full-time, paid apprenticeships in The Kitchen.

Additionally, The Kitchen serves as a meal preparation and distribution site for the Partnership For A Hunger Free Polk County. These meals go to those struggling with hunger throughout central lowa.

The Kitchen, located at The Foundry in Valley Junction, held a groundbreaking ceremony on October 25, 2018.

Luther Care Services

Project: Education and Administration Center Grant Amount: \$100,000

Luther Care Services is an assisted living facility located at the former Polk County Youth Shelter at 1546 Hull Avenue in Des Moines. The organization purchased the property in 2014. The entire building was brought up to code, with approximately 65 percent of the property undergoing renovations. But Luther Care Services had one last project to finish before the building could be considered complete.

The first phase of the remaining remodeling project created an education center, complete with a classroom and modern audio-visual equipment. Employee orientation, state-mandated training, and new management development programs take place in the new education center. The second phase brought the IT server room to current standards, resulting in improved functionality and longer life of computer servers and related hardware. Lastly, administrative offices were added, allowing the three resident apartments that previously served as staff offices to become available for rent.

The remodel project was completed in 2018.

The Nature Conservancy in Iowa

Project: Fourmile Creek Watershed's Wetland & Woodland Legacy
Grant Amount: \$100,000

The Fourmile Creek Watershed is a 76,600-acre watershed consisting of urban and agriculture communities. The watershed's northernmost reaches are located in Boone and Story counties and include

portions of the cities of Sheldahl and Slater. The largest area of the watershed is located in Polk County and encompasses the cities of Alleman, Altoona, Ankeny, Des Moines, Elkhart, and Pleasant Hill.

Fourmile Creek and its tributaries run for more than 40 miles. Resource concerns seen in and along the creek include high bacteria levels, excess nutrients (nitrogen and phosphorus), and erosion. To address growing flooding and water quality challenges, cities and counties in the watershed formed a watershed management authority (WMA) and a watershed management plan.

The implementation phase of the management plan will kick off with a series of ten signature projects that include woodland restorations, wetland constructions, oxbow wetland restorations, and detention basin constructions. These signature projects will reduce flood risk, improve water quality, increase wildlife habitat, and beautify public lands and trails along Fourmile Creek.

Prairie Meadows Scholarship

Project: Prairie Meadows Scholarship Program

Since 2001, Prairie Meadows has awarded 661 central lowa students a \$2,500 scholarship to help pay for the lowa college or university of their choice.

Our scholarship program is proud to annually award two \$2,500 scholarships to graduating high school seniors at every participating high school in Polk County, and two \$2,500 scholarships to our employees or children of employees.

Urbandale Community Action Council Inc.

Project: Urbandale Miracle League Field Grant Amount: \$100.000

More than 40,000 children and adults are living with disabilities in Greater Des Moines. To better serve these individuals, the Urbandale Community Action Network (UCAN), constructed the Urbandale Miracle League Field.

Seamlessly integrated into the Little League Complex at Urbandale's Northview Park, the custom field is made of cushioned, rubberized turf and is accessible by wheelchair and other assistive devices. The field serves residents of Adel, Clive, Cumming, Des Moines' west side, Granger, Grimes, Johnston, Perry, Urbandale, Waukee, West Des Moines, and Windsor Heights.

Miracle League serves children and adults who suffer from physical or mental disabilities that may be excluded, whether intentionally or not, from conventional leagues. In addition to the organized Miracle League softball and baseball program that caters to children with disabilities, the field can also host kickball and other inclusive events for youth and adults of all abilities.

The Urbandale Miracle League Field opened in mid-2018.

Variety – The Children's Charity

Project: Variety Star Playground at Riverview Park Grant Amount: \$100.000

Approximately 17 percent of all children born in the U.S. have behavioral or developmental conditions that require special care. The majority of playgrounds throughout lowa do not offer adaptations for these children. In 2014, Variety provided the City of Des Moines with its first all-inclusive playground, the Ashley Okland Star Playground. Based on the positive feedback and success of that first playground, Variety saw a need and desire for all-inclusive playgrounds in other lowa communities.

In 2018, Variety launched a campaign to give the Des Moines area a second playground – The Variety Star Playground at Riverview Park. The park will include equipment that emphasizes key functions like balance, strength, and obesity prevention, as well as interactive learning walls. It will also feature wheelchair-accessible ramps, a flat rubber play surface, and a variety of play structures designed to improve core strength.

The playground's design will encourage play among children of all abilities, helping to break down barriers and foster friendships. The Variety Star Playground will also be a welcome resource for parents with disabilities and aging caregivers who want to interact with their children.

The playground's construction will be part of the Riverview Park renovation effort. Upon completion, the park will be donated to the city of Des Moines. It is planned to be built in 2019.


Wildwood Hills Ranch

Project: Cabins of Hope Grant Amount: \$100,000

Nestled on 400 acres in the scenic hills of Madison County, Wildwood Hills Ranch of Iowa (the Ranch) offers at-risk youth a safe space to learn new life skills and regain confidence. Each year, the Ranch serves 1,000 students from across the state of Iowa facing difficult life situations. Youth ranging in age from 8 to 18 participate in daily and weekly camps focused on providing foundational tools such as educational attainment, job skills, financial literacy, leadership development, and character formation.

The demand for youth programming has outgrown the current capacity of the Ranch's facilities, forcing volunteer staff to sleep inside offices or wherever there is room for a cot. The Ranch devised a plan to build eight additional cabins to house the expanding numbers of volunteer staff.

The cabins will also be available for corporate retreats that serve as an important revenue source for the Ranch's youth programming. The increased capacity of overnight housing will significantly improve the organization's ability to prepare at-risk youth for the rest of their lives.


