

# Our History

Now that our 30th year has come to a close, we look back on decades of achievements – from finding a location in a vacant pasture to transforming it into a beautiful racetrack, luxury hotel, award-winning restaurants, and a casino with every game this side of Vegas.

#### 1980s

In the early 1980s, several local businessmen had a vision that would help lowa's agricultural community, spur economic development and job growth in central lowa, and create an entertainment venue that would attract visitors from all over the Midwest. That vision was Prairie Meadows Racetrack.


Ken Grandquist, Jack Bishop, Ed Skinner, Jim Rasmussen, and Gary Palmer were local leaders and entrepreneurs who had spent their lives in central lowa. Over the course of several years, these five men – with the help of hundreds of local supporters, volunteers, and civic leaders – promoted the business concept of Prairie Meadows Racetrack.

In July 1984 the Iowa Racing Commission issued the state's first pari-mutuel license that would allow for the construction of a horse track. A 240-acre site, just east of Adventureland Park, was selected as the location for this new venture.

The Polk County Board of Supervisors voted to back the \$40 million in bonds necessary to build the track. The racehorses burst out of Prairie Meadows' starting gate for the very first time on March 1, 1989. Despite cold temps, a sellout crowd of more than 7,100 were there, eager to wager on lowa's first horse races.

#### 1990s

The early 1990s brought new economic challenges to the state of lowa. These challenges weighed heavily on Prairie Meadows' bottom line. The revenue from horse racing and dining at Prairie Meadows was not meeting expectations, and the property was forced to file for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection in November of 1991.







Governor Terry Branstad in 1994. In May of that same year, Polk County voters also approved the referendum of adding slot machines by a 62 to 38 percent margin.

With approval from the state and county, it was now time to decide how to manage Prairie Meadows. President of the Racing Association of central Iowa, Jim Rasmussen, had an idea that would greatly benefit Polk County. He envisioned Prairie Meadows running as a public nonprofit, dedicated to lessening the burden of government by raising funds for charitable organizations and community improvement projects. It was decided that Prairie Meadows would be managed locally and overseen by a board of directors. That decision in 1994 has resulted in millions of dollars in profits remaining in Iowa and Polk County – profits that would have left the state if an outside management firm had taken over operations of Prairie Meadows. Prairie Meadows is currently one of only two casinos in the U.S. that functions as a nonprofit.

On April 1, 1995, a capacity crowd of 15,000 poured through the doors of the nation's first racino – a horse track and slot machine casino combination. The addition of slots was met with unprecedented success.


This private-public partnership allowed Prairie Meadows to repay nearly \$90 million of debt to Polk County in just 20 short months. The success continued, and over the years, Prairie Meadows has grown into the No. 1 entertainment destination in Iowa.

#### **2000s - TODAY**

In 2004, Prairie Meadows added table games to the mix. The property expanded its entertainment offerings by adding the The Meadows Events & Conference Center in 2007. Soon after, Prairie Meadows opened restaurants Triple Crown Buffet and AJ's Steakhouse. With the completion of Prairie Meadows Hotel in 2012, guests were able to stay and play - making Prairie Meadows a major tourist destination. Another restaurant, Café at the Meadows debuted shortly after. And in 2016, a new loyalty program, Prairie Gold Rewards, launched. This program rewards gaming and non-gaming quests and offers some of the best casino benefits in the Midwest. The newest gaming addition at Prairie Meadows began in 2019. On August 15, 2019, lowa's first sports books opened and began taking wagers. Prairie Meadows partnered with America's leading sports book operator, William Hill, to bring guests the best in sports betting.

Prairie Meadows is the result of a complete community effort, thanks to the commitment of volunteers, business leaders, elected officials, and hundreds of others who have been instrumental in the development and continued success of one of the great private-public business experiments in the entertainment industry.



# egacy Grants

Through our legacy grant program, we awarded more than \$34 million to organizations and communities in Iowa. These large scale projects help shape and enrich the lives of all Iowans.

#### **CENTRAL COLLEGE**

Project: Douwstra: A New Regional Concert Hall

Grant Amount: \$100,000

Central College's \$6 million renovation of Pella historical landmark Douwstra Auditorium will elevate this concert hall's interior, acoustics, and back-ofhouse infrastructure to be one of the Midwest's most state-of-the-art regional concert venues. Douwstra Auditorum was built in 1939 and served as the campus chapel until being converted to a concert hall. The College has recently completed phase one of the concert hall's two-phase project renovations with the help of generous private donations. Phase one of this project included updates to the interior, with new seating, a lighted art sculpture, acoustical improvements, the most up-to-date sound, lighting, and multimedia systems, and more. The funds provided by Prairie Meadows will help with phase two of this project including the installation of a hand-crafted Casavant Frères pipe organ and backof-house infrastructure. The pipe organ will be the centerpiece of this renovation. The new acoustical improvements will showcase the organ's incredible sound and its elegant beauty will harmonize with all the structural renovations. Douwstra Auditorium will continue to be the heart of Central College's campus providing a space for students and central lowans to experience the arts, learn from world leaders, delight in the sounds of the pipe organ, and enjoy highquality musical performances.

#### **CHARLES CITY COMMUNITY SCHOOL DISTRICT**

**Project: Charles City Sports Complex** 

Grant Amount: \$150,000

The Charles City School District has been working to solve a recurring problem in their area - flooding of Sportsmen's Park which is home to their middle and high school softball and baseball teams. More than 200 games have been cancelled or relocated in the past eight years due to flooding. The problem had become so prevalent that parents and community members often brought sump pumps and shop vacs to the fields to help remove water so the athletes could play. The district's plan is relocating the fields to the high school campus, out of the flood plain. Construction of the new fields began in September 2019. Both fields are dynamically constructed with irrigation and drainage systems to ensure playability the entire season. Prairie Meadows' donation along with other local donors have this project on track to be completed in time for the 2020 season.

#### **CHILDSERVE FOUNDATION**

Project: Forward Together Capital Campaign Grant Amount: \$500,000

ChildServe is a specialty pediatric healthcare organization that has partnered with families for 92 years to help identify and meet the unique needs of children with developmental delays, disabilities, injuries, and other special healthcare needs. Each

year, the organization serves more than 4.600 children across the state. ChildServe provides more than 30 services, including pediatric rehabilitation; physical, occupational, and speech therapy; long-term care; behavioral health, and autism support. The organization launched the Forward Together campaign to raise funds for its signature programs in complex medical care, pediatric rehabilitation, and behavioral health and autism. The funds raised will be allocated to these campaign priorities: opening a new pediatric inpatient rehabilitation unit specializing in brain injury, multi-trauma, orthopedic, spinal cord, and burn and wound care; establishing a pediatric behavioral health clinic; and expanding service capacity for individuals who have complex medical conditions and require specialized nursing.

#### **CITY OF DES MOINES PARKS AND** RECREATION DEPARTMENT

Project: James W. Cownie Sports Park Signage Improvements Grant Amount: \$150,000

Prairie Meadows awarded the City of Des Moines Parks and Recreation Department dollars for new wayfinding signage for James W. Cownie Sports Park. The new entrance sign at SE 14th St. and Hartford Ave. in Des Moines is now named Prairie Meadows Championship Way in honor of this grant. The sign



arches over Hartford Ave., spanning 91' and is 26' tall. In addition, cantilevered signage was added to SE 14th St. with directional arrows for traffic approaching from the north and south. The James W. Cownie Sports Complex is made up of soccer and baseball fields. The soccer complex is home to many local high school and college teams. It features 12 irrigated turf soccer fields with one field considered championship level with seating for 2,000 fans, press box, and video platform. The baseball facility has eight irrigated turf diamonds with covered bleacher seating, batting cages, and concession stand.

#### **CITY OF MARSHALLTOWN**

Project: Renovation of Veterans Memorial Coliseum Grant Amount: \$200,000

Veterans Memorial Coliseum opened in 1929 as a memorial to the residents of Marshalltown who had served and lost their lives in the Civil War, Spanish American War, and World War I. Over the years, the building has served many purposes including a community center, gymnasium for Marshalltown High School, and home to the local American Legion. More recently the building has been used for the City of Marshalltown's indoor recreation programs and

summer camps, as well as other community events. Renovation plans were put in place in 2017 to convert the gym space into two full-sized basketball courts and remodel the remaining areas into flexible use spaces. The renovation plans experienced a setback due to a tornado that ravaged downtown Marshalltown on July 19, 2018 which caused extensive damage to the building. Prairie Meadows' grant will help get the \$3.6 million renovation back on track so Veterans Memorial Coliseum can continue to provide an indoor recreational space for the residents of Marshalltown.



Grant Amount: \$50,000

The Roland Municipal Swimming Pool has been serving the residents of Roland and surrounding communities since 1968. Portions of the pool underwent renovations in 2000, but the pool's infrastructure is now in a state where renovations are no longer possible. The dollars Prairie Meadows has provided will be used to help the City replace its aging pool. The pool is a vital piece of the community during the summer months and this grant will help ensure the city will have this summer hot spot for the next generation of residents.

#### CITY OF WEST DES MOINES

Project: MidAmerican Energy RecPlex Grant Amount: \$600,000

The demand for quality youth sports facilities are greater than ever in central lowa. To meet this demand, the City of West Des Moines, in cooperation with local leaders, and a variety of

organizations, is creating the MidAmerican Energy Company RecPlex. This new 60 acre, city-owned facility will be a youth-focused athletic venue, offering soccer, ice hockey, basketball and a wide range of other recreational and educational programs. The \$46 million project includes two ice hockey rinks with seating for 2,100 people, 90,000 square feet of indoor synthetic turf, four indoor basketball courts with availability for eight volleyball courts, indoor baseball and softball, three lighted outdoor synthetic turf soccer fields, locker rooms, and multi-purpose spaces. This first-ofits-kind complex greatly increases year-round access to sports programs for a growing youth community. In addition to youth sports, the complex will also offer adult leagues, an outdoor playground, and many other amenities. Multipurpose space can also be used for corporate meetings, smaller conventions, and trade shows.

Project: High and Low Ropes Course Grant Amount: \$50,000

Community Youth Concepts' mission is to engage and connect lowa students through youth development programming and to provide coaching, training, and technical assistance in best practices to youth-serving nonprofits. To support their mission Community Youth Concepts (CYC) is developing a challenge course – Stowe Heights – at Stowe Elementary in Des Moines. The course is a combination of mental and physical challenges that requires groups to work as a team to accomplish goals. Participants learn valuable information about themselves and the group through the course's fun and unusual activities.

Stowe Heights is a series of high and low ropes courses with obstacles in between that will be ADA accessible. Prairie Meadows funding will help with the construction process of the high ropes course. CYC programs impact nearly 900 students each year through their programs.



Project: Skilled Trades Academy Renovation Project Grant Amount: \$150,000

Central lowa continues to battle a critical shortage of skilled trades workers, and it's predicted to worsen over time. In 2016, the Skilled Trades Alliance was formed in Des Moines by a group of dedicated industry professionals who recognized the need to address the shortage. The Alliance partnered with Des Moines Public Schools to develop the Skilled Trades Academy at Central Campus, providing trades-focused education and training opportunities to students.

Dollars provided by Prairie Meadows will help renovate the Academy's existing space at Central Campus and will provide expanded trades-focused programming through two new classrooms and two new labs for the Plumbing/HVAC and Electrical programs. These updates will help to accommodate larger numbers of students and provide an avenue for closing the skilled trades gap in Iowa.

#### **EASTER SEALS SOCIETY OF IOWA**

Project: Independence Innovation Center at Camp Sunnyside Grant Amount: \$400,000

Easterseals Iowa was established more than 90 years ago to support persons with disabilites in Iowa. Today, Easterseals continues to provide services to ensure all people with disabilities or special needs, and their families have equal opportunities to live, learn, work, and play in their communities. The organization offers more than 15 programs promoting independence opportunities including year-round, seven day a week, and 24 hour per day programs.

Prairie Meadows' grant will be used for the construction of the new Independence Innovation Center which will provide Easterseals team members

a central location to complete work, meet to discuss strategies for client success, and create an environment of inclusiveness for all of their current and prospective team members. In addition to this project, dollars will be used to renovate the building that currently serves as the main office; thus, increasing program space for Easterseals' Young Adult and Teen Day Program. The new Prairie Meadows Teen and Young Adult Center will provide even more programming space for these youth, and the support families need to know their loved one is safe during the day.

The construction and renovation of buildings at Camp Sunnyside will continue Easterseals Iowa's commitment of caring for children and adults with physical and intellectual disabilities, mental illness, and special needs. Easterseals Iowa serves more than 3,500 people annually.

#### **IOWA ASIAN ALLIANCE**

Project: Asian Garden Expansion Grant Amount: \$100,000

The Robert D. Ray Asian Garden was established in 2004 to be a beacon for lowans to celebrate their rich and diverse heritage and to commemorate the work of former Governor Ray on behalf of thousands of Southeast Asian refugees by welcoming them to Iowa. The legacy grant from Prairie Meadows will support the renovation efforts of the Iowa Asian Alliance in keeping this landmark site a cherished tribute to diversity in Iowa through Governor Ray's humantarian efforts and leadership.

Updates include expanding landscaping elements to make the gardens an engaging experience representative of all Asian cultures with art and landscaping displays. Plans include connecting the

Garden to several of the walkways and trails in the area to make it more accessible to pedestrians; converting the ponds and water features to fountains to decrease maintenance and upkeep expenses; as well as lighting and security upgrades to protect the venue. The Alliance is planning a grand re-opening of the Asian Garden in mid-2021.

#### **ISISERETTES DRILL AND** DRUM CORPS., INC.

Project: Isiserettes Drill and Drum Corps Practice Facility Grant Amount: \$100,000

The Isiserettes Drill and Drum Corps has been part of the Des Moines cultural scene for 39 years. Isiserettes core values are to build character and social skills through the areas of music, dance, arts, and culture. Grant dollars provided by Prairie Meadows will be used toward the purchase of a permanent practice facility for this long-standing youth program. With this purchase, the program will have an established central location; storage areas for equipment, uniforms, and supplies; room to expand academic support including a computer lab with wi-fi access; tutoring opportunities; and collaborative work areas for group members to do school work/projects and to choreograph routines and drum cadences.

#### **LUCAS COUNTY FAIR ASSOCIATION**

Project: Project Undercover Grant Amount: \$100,000

The Lucas County Fair has been a south central Iowa tradition since 1954. The county fair is held in late July and provides educational activities to cultivate skills for area youth. Exhibits include 4-H, FFA, and open class projects. In order to continue to provide a safe and up-to-date facility for these exhibitors, Prairie Meadows' grant dollars will be used to improve the outdoor arena at the Lucas County fairgrounds.



#### **MADISON COUNTY FOUNDATION FOR ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION**

**Project: Madison County Conservation Center** Grant Amount: \$100,000


The Madison County Foundation for Environmental Education (MCFEE) is on the forefront of expanding environmental education in central lowa. Since its founding in 1982, MCFEE has been providing funds for environmental education programs; land acquisitions to increase public access to natural resources; upgrades to county park facilities; and wildlife habitat improvements. The newest venture for MCFEE is the construction of the Environmental Learning Center. The purpose of the Center is to meet the expanding needs of environmental education and outdoor recreation programming in central lowa. The Center will serve as the hub of environmental learning and outdoor recreation opportunities within Pammel State Park with its limestone bluffs, heavily forested river valleys, and rolling grasslands. The Center will promote outdoor learning experiences through interactive exhibits that encourage outdoor exploration; a classroom for hands-on STEM based programming; and a multipurpose room for events, seminars, and social gatherings.

Access to the Center's educational exhibits and instructional facilities will be free during normal public operating hours.

#### POLK COUNTY HOUSING TRUST FUND

Project: Down Payment Assistance Program Grant Amount: \$250,000

The Polk County Housing Trust Fund is the comprehensive planning, advocacy, and funding organization for affordable housing in Polk County. Focused around these core activities, the Housing Trust Fund is responsible for crafting a community strategic plan for affordable housing and leading its implementation. The organization is also the voice of advocacy for helping the community understand the need for and benefits of adequate affordable housing. And, the Housing Trust Fund is responsible for allocating community funds for increasing and preserving the number of affordable homes in the county and improving the lives of the people who live in them. Prairie Meadows grant dollars will be put to use as funding for the Down Payment Assistance Program for low to moderate income households. The purpose of this program is to make new construction affordable for families who make 80% of the area's median income or less and to



encourage cities and builders to construct new homes in Polk County in an affordable range for these buyers.

#### **RONALD MCDONALD HOUSE CHARITIES OF CENTRAL IOWA, INC.**

Project: You are the Key to the House: Building a Ronald McDonald House inside MercyOne Children's Hospital Grant Amount: \$200,000

Since 1974, Ronald McDonald House Charities network of local chapters have been making children

families together – giving them a place to rest and refresh and a place that feels like home. These programs, tailored to meet the urgent needs of each community, can now be found in more than 58 countries and regions across the globe. Ronald McDonald House Charities of Central lowa is embarking on adding another "home away from home" inside MercyOne Children's Hospital. Grant money from Prairie Meadows will contribute to the transformation of a wing on the 4th floor of the Children's Hospital into a Ronald McDonald House. The house will have 14 quest rooms, a great room, lounge area, lactation room, laundry area, shared kitchen and dining space, as well as other areas for visiting with daytime guests. This is the second Ronald McDonald House in Des Moines. It opened on January 7, 2020.

Project: Highway 65 Underpass Grant Amount: \$200,000

Iowa's multipurpose trails total more than 2,000 miles and make the state the World Capital of Trails. In an effort to close some of the trail gaps in eastern Polk county, the city of Bondurant has been awarded a legacy grant from Prairie Meadows to complete the Mud Creek extension of the 35-mile Gay Lea Wilson Trail loop. An underpass beneath U.S. Highway 65 is the final critical step in completing this loop connecting Bondurant, Altoona, Pleasant Hill, Des Moines, Ankeny, and rural Polk county. With the underpass completion, citizens can safely traverse Highway 65 and children will be able to ride their bikes or walk to school.
